## **MARTIN LEWIS**

Described by L.A. He has been engaged in so many consequential interactions with high-profile individuals over the last half-century that some wonder if he is a self-propelled 'agent provocateur'.

He gently demurs and makes the point that the majority of his many adventures have been - and continue to be - diplomatic and consensual.

"I think my interactions usually have sufficient chivalry, courtesy, honor and humor to be described as 'gentlemanly'. So if I may slightly re-punctuate that descriptive I would say that I am 'A **Gent** Provocateur'..."
